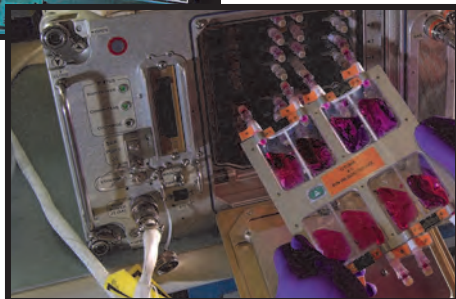

MARKETING HIGHLIGHTS IN 2008

THE YEAR IN REVIEW: Operating under an established and effective strategic plan proved to be invaluable, since 2008 presented many opportunities as well as challenges for the Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership. We were asked to take the lead on several important initiatives in addition to those already in progress. Although the aftermath of Hurricane Ike prevailed over the economic landscape in the last quarter of the year, it also served as a platform to continue our leadership role as the “go to” economic development organization within the region.

2008 Marketing Highlights

- » By invitation of 13 economic development organizations from four counties, led delegation to Austin to discuss change of vetting process for site selection of relocation projects.
- » Created International Maritime Advisory Committee that is building a workforce pipeline between local high schools, San Jacinto College, Texas A & M University at Galveston, and the University of Houston — Clear Lake. Pasadena Independent School District to initiate maritime curriculum at all five high schools in fall 2009.
- » Worked with the Houston Airport System and Colliers International in development of Ellington Airport; continued work on expansion of military presence at Ellington Field Joint Reserve Base, which will ultimately result in an increased military presence of approximately 6,500.
- » Strengthened partnerships with regional economic development organizations by hosting 10 European biotech companies and aerospace trade journal writers, co-sponsoring 7th Annual Harris County Economic Development Summit as well as Harris County's Economic Update featuring Green Building Tax Abatement Program. More than 25 meetings were held during 2008 with allied organizations.

- » Met with international delegations from nine countries to promote Bay Area Houston to uncover new leads for expansion purposes. Of particular interest were two meetings held with private executives and high ranking public and academic officials from Stavanger, Norway.
- » Attended 14 trade shows focused on wide range of industries. Municipal partners and NASA executive on loan invited to assist in promoting the region and to gain new leads.
- » Increased efforts to build upon relationships with state and national organizations, allowing dialogue with experts having the critical guidance needed for generating and working leads while providing access to decision makers.

2009 Marketing Plans

- » Will continue to develop the maritime marketing message by driving the maritime education pipeline forward to include additional maritime programs in the Bay Area Houston school districts.
- » Will increase tradeshow efforts to lay the foundation for new opportunities.
- » Will join with Colliers International, the Houston Airport System, CenterPoint Energy and others to create an Ellington Airport marketing display to take on the road to the 62nd Annual Meeting and Convention of the National Business Aviation Association as well as other national events.
- » Will become engaged in statewide chemical industrial associations to include the Association of Chemical Industry of Texas (ACIT).
- » Will continue to build upon relationships with industry representatives, site consultants, economic development allies, state agencies, local, state and national officials.

RECRUITMENT SNAPSHOT: Despite the national economy's best efforts to slow us down, our team is proud to feature the successful Bay Area Houston projects shown above.

One of our goals was to focus on high quality, high paying jobs for the region, and to this effort, we succeeded. We continued to strengthen the region's economy by attracting companies that support our core industries of aerospace, bioscience and specialty chemical.

IN 2009, our marketing team will focus on intensifying its efforts of business retention while planting the seeds for future growth among our current roster of companies. This includes our biannual effort to lead a delegation for two important industry events at the state capital: Texas Chemical Day Feb. 26 and Space Week Austin March 3-5.

MARKETING COLLATERAL: A critical part of keeping the Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership at the forefront of our community is our marketing collateral.

Published online five times each year, the *Business Development Update* features the latest in commercial, industrial, office, retail, hospital, residential and infrastructure news.

BAHEP's *Business to Business* page is featured monthly in the *Houston Chronicle*, the *Bay Area Citizen*, the *Pasadena Citizen* and the *Friendswood Journal*. It contains news pertaining to the organization's initiatives as well as those of our members.

Debuting in 2008 was BAHEP's *Business Briefs* online newsletter. Published in the spring, summer, fall and winter, the newsletter provides our membership and other interested parties a snapshot of many of the organization's activities as reported to our municipalities. It serves to keep our members better informed and involved as we work together on a shared regional vision.

HURRICANE IKE RECOVERY INITIATIVES

Undeniably, the major event of 2008 was Hurricane Ike. He roared across Galveston Island in the early morning hours of Sept. 13. Daylight brought with it sunshine and the very harsh reality of the massive recovery effort that would be required to bring southeast Texas back stronger than ever.

Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership took action immediately to assist its member cities in getting the word out about their individual recovery needs. Many initiatives followed, and we will continue these efforts for as long as is necessary. A brief description of actions already taken is shown on these two pages.



1. **Hurricane Ike Media Event**

BAHEP, with assistance from Griffin Integrated Marketing, organized a news conference on Sept. 17 where 10 area mayors, U.S. Congressman Nick Lampson, Harris County Judge Ed Emmett, Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Sylvia R. Garcia, Center-Point Energy Area Service Director Jim Darnell, and Guy Rankin of Harris County's Community Services Department spoke about community damage, accessing assistance, debris removal, and restoration of public services.

2. **FEMA Programs Briefing to Local Governments**

On Sept. 19, BAHEP hosted a meeting in its conference room for member cities to learn about the numerous Federal

Emergency Management Agency programs available to municipalities and their residents. Congressman Nick Lampson, Harris County Judge Ed Emmett, and State Reps. John Davis and Larry Taylor, together with mayors and city managers, were on hand for the briefing from 10 FEMA officials and to offer their personal assistance.

3. **FEMA Public Assistance Applicants Briefing**

In response to BAHEP's member cities' request following their Sept. 19 meeting at the partnership, numerous members of a FEMA team met with state and local officials during a FEMA Public Assistance Applicants briefing at St. Paul's Catholic Church in Nassau Bay, Texas, on Sept. 24.

4. **Top State Legislators Given Tour of Ike's Damage**

Bob Mitchell participated in a meeting with Texas House Speaker Tom Cradick and House Appropriations Committee Chairman Warren Chisum on Sept. 25 in Nassau Bay's City Hall. State Sen. Mike Jackson and State Rep. John Davis invited these top legislators to tour the area and suggested ways the state might help the local communities recover.



5. **Sjostrom Gives Tour Showing Ike's Damage in Galveston County**

On Oct. 2, Jeff Sjostrom, president of the Galveston Economic Development Partnership, gave Bob Mitchell a tour of the City of Galveston and West Beach showing damage inflicted by Hurricane Ike. They discussed ways in which BAHEP could assist in the recovery effort.

HURRICANE IKE RECOVERY INITIATIVES

6. National Flood Insurance Program meeting

BAHEP organized and hosted a meeting Oct. 10 to allow government officials of area municipalities to address representatives of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Several cities requested that BAHEP host the meeting so that area cities could develop a common, comprehensive procedure that meets NFIP guidelines to allow them to begin issuing building permits in their cities.

7. Business recovery workshops

On Oct. 22, BAHEP and the Seabrook Economic Development Corporation hosted a "Seabrook Business Recovery Workshop." Representatives from FEMA, the Small Business Administration, the Small Business Development Center, the Internal Revenue Service, and the Seabrook Building Department met with business owners. On Nov. 19, BAHEP worked with the Kemah Community Development Corporation to stage an additional comprehensive workshop for Kemah's business owners to assist them in their recovery efforts.

8. **FEMA's Administrator Paulison meets with Bay Area mayors**
Administrator R. David Paulison met with a standing-room-only gathering of Bay Area mayors and other officials during a special meeting held in the conference room of BAHEP on Nov. 6. Harris County Judge Ed Emmett had recommended to Paulison that he meet with the mayors of the cities on the Gulf side of Houston that suffered the most damage due to the impact of Hurricane Ike.

9. FEMA's ESF #14

Matt Campbell, national coordinator for FEMA's ESF #14, also spoke to those gathered to meet with Administrator Paulison on Nov. 6 about his services. ESF #14 provides a framework to promote successful long-term recovery for communities suffering significant damages, where local capacity is limited as in smaller cities. ESF #14 provides support during the formative phases of long-term recovery, usually for the first three to nine months. The mayors in attendance immediately welcomed this type of program, and BAHEP will assist Campbell in initiating it with its member cities.



10. EDA grant proposal

BAHEP brought area officials together once again on Nov. 19 to discuss grant money available from the U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration to assist Ike impacted cities. BAHEP provided assistance to cities that are applying for this and other grant opportunities relative to Ike.

MARKETING HIGHLIGHTS IN AEROSPACE

IN 2008, BAHEP led the way regionally in aerospace advocacy through its Aerospace Advisory Committee and the AAC's three sub-committees: Team NASA, Space Center Volunteers and Citizens for Space Exploration.

Successful advocacy events

We had a number of successful state and local advocacy events this year including Johnson Space Center Director Mike Coats' State of the Center Address, Congressman Nick Lampson's NASA 50th panel discussion, and U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison's NASA 50th anniversary celebration. Team NASA participated in the Houston A+ Challenge where 26 teachers spent a week at the Johnson Space Center to learn of all the employment opportunities that NASA has to offer students once their education is completed.

BAHEP hosts Texas legislative staffers

We hosted the "first ever" Texas State Legislators' Chiefs of Staff tour of JSC. Thirty-seven staffers spent a day in Bay Area Houston where they were treated to lunch at Space Center Houston that included a presentation on Texas Aerospace Scholars (TAS), the Technology Outreach Program (TOP), and our efforts to secure a shuttle orbiter for Space Center Houston when the orbiters are retired. That was followed by a

CSE sets record in congressional office visits

An effective national advocacy effort took place in May during our 17th annual trip to Washington, D.C. One hundred and forty-seven travelers from 29 states made a record 333 congressional office visits this year. Thirty-six college students participated to help us present our message of "1% for our Future." Reflecting back to the Apollo days when NASA received over 5% of the federal budget, we stressed that our current .6 of 1% is not enough, and we encouraged Congress to

MARKETING HIGHLIGHTS IN AEROSPACE

NASA medal awarded

Locally, our aerospace marketing efforts were recognized by NASA Johnson Space Center. On behalf of the entire BAHEP organization, Bob Mitchell was honored to accept NASA's Exceptional Public Service Medal. Mike Coats, center director, said the award was for "Exemplary contributions in educating the Public, Community Leaders, and Elected Officials on the impacts NASA has on Bay Area Houston, on Texas, and on our Nation."

IN 2009, we plan to continue our advocacy efforts by an expanded trip to Austin. Space Week Austin will focus on increasing funding for both the Texas Aerospace Scholars and the Technology Outreach Program and giving our state legislators a better understanding of the positive impact JSC has on the state. On our 18th annual trip to Washington, CSE plans to meet with every freshman member of Congress and all key committee chairs as well as to maintain the other benchmarks from the 2008 trip.

MARKETING HIGHLIGHTS IN SATOP

SATOP shifts focus

In 2008, the Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership's Space Alliance Technology Outreach Program shifted focus to the 10-county region surrounding the NASA Johnson Space Center. SATOP and its network of Alliance Partners assisted over 50 small businesses with technical challenges using expertise developed through the United States Space Program.



Mitchell addresses Congress on importance of SATOP funding

Bob Mitchell addressed Congress' Appropriations Subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, and Science and Related Agencies earlier this year to speak about the importance of reinstating SATOP's funding in the NASA budget. That

funding request was granted, and SATOP is once again in line to receive funding once the new budget is appropriated.

Alliance Partners committed to SATOP

Engineers and scientists from aerospace companies, colleges and NASA field centers offered their time and expertise to solve technical challenges for small businesses. SATOP Texas Alliance Partners committed up to 16,000 engineering hours to the program.

SATOP partners Texas Children's Hospital with NASA JSC

SATOP provided a solution to a request submitted by Texas Children's Hospital. TCH was trying to find a way to mitigate shock and vibration during transport of super premature babies in incubators to its hospital and others. The neonatal incubators are transported by plane, helicopter, and ambulance. This is an issue of world-wide concern in the neonatal community.



SATOP partnered TCH with NASA JSC, which developed vibration testing methods and loaned out special vibration meters in order for TCH to conduct

the needed analysis. BAHEP has been facilitating a Space Act Agreement between JSC and TCH in order to provide ongoing engineering assistance to mentor TCH in its development of vibration isolation devices for the incubators.

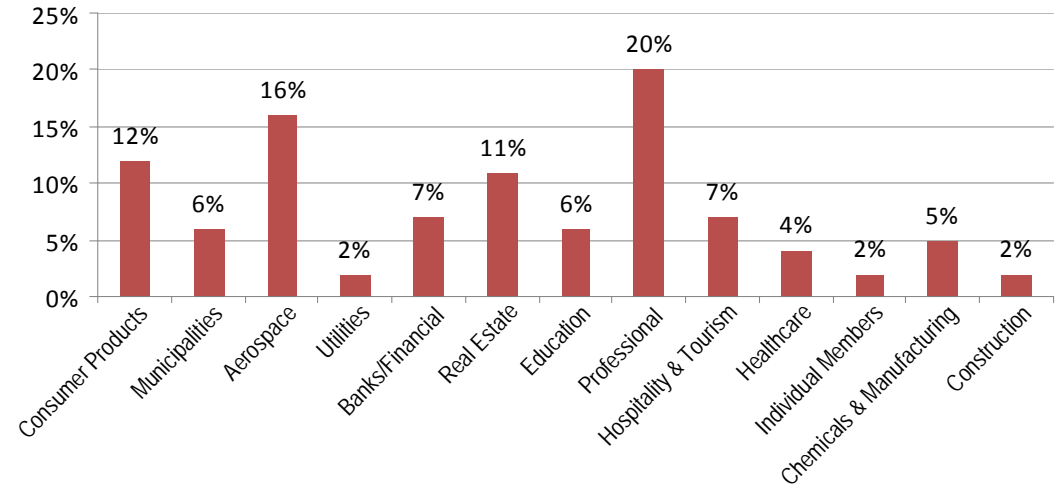

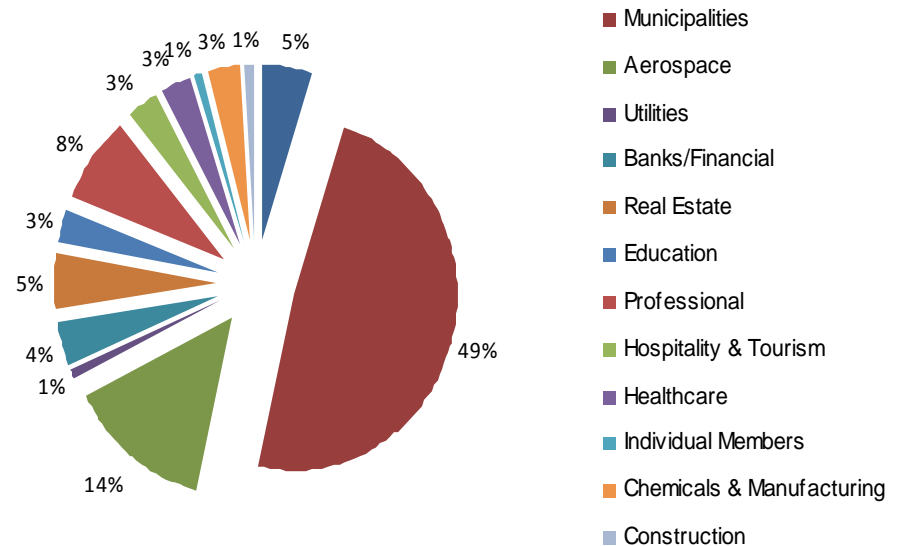
