SJCD, UH-CL maintain academic calendars

The San Jacinto College District reports that due to Hurricane Ike, instructional leaders worked to develop a plan to get students successfully through the fall semester. They came up with an innovative plan to complete all courses, complete 100 percent of the learning objectives, and finish the semester according to the existing academic calendar.

Theresa Presswood, communications director at the University of Houston - Clear Lake, stated, "UH-Clear Lake reopened Monday, Sept. 22, with a plan for students to successfully complete the required coursework without extending the fall semester. The academic affairs leadership team, led by Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost Carl A. Stockton, developed a schedule for Friday and Saturday make up class times, with flexibility to adjust as needed on a case-by-case basis."

Post Ike revenue critical to small businesses

Political Protocol Committee

BAHEP committee shifts into high gear during elections

Political activity in the nation as well as the region continues to gain momentum in the remaining days prior to Nov. 4, 2008, Election Day. The selection of a new U.S. president will coincide with the 2008 Senate elections in 33 states, House of Representatives elections in all states, and gubernatorial elections in 11 states, as well as various state referendums and local elections.

The results of these elections will undoubtedly impact the nation's economy; therefore, economic development organizations are keeping a keen eye on the issues at stake. Assisting the Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership in doing this is its Political Protocol Committee, which serves as the coordinator for political activities within BAHEP. According to Marcy Fryday, PPC chairman for the past five years, the committee's primary function is "to be a vehicle by which BAHEP's

membership can be educated about legislative positions and goals accomplished by our elected officials." She added that the second most important function of the committee is, in turn, to educate the elected officials about the mission of Bay Area Houston Economic Partnership.

The PPC is active throughout the year, although its momentum increases during election years and years when the Texas legislature is in session. A State Candidates Forum scheduled for Sept. 17 had to be cancelled due to Hurricane Ike. However, the committee was able to reschedule its U.S. Congressional District 22 Candidates Forum from Oct. 1 to Oct. 20.

Other 2008 events sponsored by the Political Protocol Committee included updates from NASA-Johnson Space Center, Ellington Airport, and issues concerning transportation/hurricane

evacuation - all topics of interest and importance not only to BAHEP membership but to everyone in Bay Area Houston.

Fryday commented on an additional event saying, "For the first time, we held a reception for all elected officials before our annual State of the Counties address by Judge Jim Yarbrough of Galveston and Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Sylvia R. Garcia. This was a hugely successful event, which we plan to make an annual tradition." Over 60 elected officials and 150 business leaders attended the June reception and meeting held at the Hilton Houston NASA Clear Lake.

Annually, the PPC also sponsors an Elected Officials Appreciation Luncheon, which relays BAHEP's recognition of these officials' support for the organization as well as the solid economic development in the Bay Area due in large part to their initiatives. Fryday stated, "This also serves as a motivating factor to ALL elected officials to further support our organization and its mission."

The results of the committee's efforts have been favorable. "We have received both verbal and written appreciation from elected officials thanking us for providing a venue where they can share their views," Fryday said.

With an election just around the corner and the Texas legislature about to convene in January 2009, it looks like it's going to be another busy year for this hard-working BAHEP committee.
